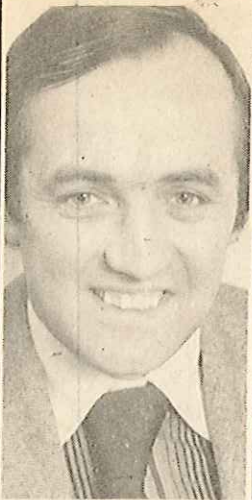

Doctor's call to office

THE New President of West Fife Rotary Club is Dr Kenneth MacKay, a General Practitioner in Dunfermline.

Dr McKay, a founder member of the Club, was installed to office at their meeting on Tuesday in the Pitfirrane Arms Hotel, Crossford.

Following a brief valedictory address by the outgoing President, Mr Roy Petrie, Dr MacKay addressed the club on Rotary aspirations for the forthcoming year.

Dr McKay is a native of Oban, and came to Fife in 1975 after a period in Australia. He lives in Limekilns, with his wife, Veronica, and three children.

Other new office-bearers within the Club are:— Secretary, Mr David Forbes, 26 Kirkwood Crescent, Crossford; and treasurer, Mr Gilmour Scoon, 10 Bogwood Drive, Crossford.

A HOME FOR FUNDS

SCOTLAND'S first custom-built Cheshire Home for the disabled is to benefit from the fund-raising efforts of two West Fife organisations.

The Rotary Club of West Fife and the staff of Jeltek Weatherguard, Manclark & Son Ltd., Halbeath, clubbed together and have raised almost £700 for the cause.

The Rotary Club's contribution came in the form of the proceeds of a prize draw they held in conjunction with the Edinburgh Marathon.

Their President, Dr Ken Mackay, ran in the event and their prize draw was based on how long he would take to complete the course.

The person who made the nearest calculation of how long it would take Dr Mackay to finish — three hours 58.33 minutes — won a weekend for two in London.

In addition to Club members selling the tickets, the staff of Jeltek agreed to make a contribution. In addition to selling the "marathon tickets" among their employees, the staff and management joined together in battle — in a sporting manner — for a charity football match.

The match was held on 24th August, between "Jeltek Allstars" and "Old Crocks Select" (staff and management), and the goals were sponsored.

At a presentation in the Pitfirrane Arms Hotel, on Tuesday evening, Dr Mackay handed over the "joint" proceeds to the Earl of Elgin, Patron of Fife Cheshire Homes.

Also in attendance were Mrs Jean Mackenzie secretary of Fife Cheshire Homes; Mr Brian Merrett, Junior Vice-President of the Rotary Club of West Fife and Miss Aileen Swindley, personnel assistant at Jeltek.

The cheque, for £692, is not the final total, however, for money is still coming in.

"We expect that an additional sum will be handed over once the prize has been paid for and our other expenses have been met," explained Dr Mackay.



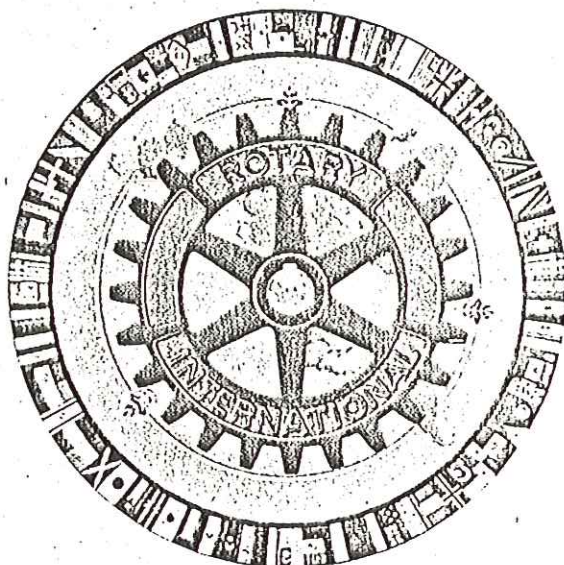

President Ken welcomed Alex Kirk and David Moyes, 2 new members, on behalf of the Club, at a short induction ceremony on Tuesday, 30th November.

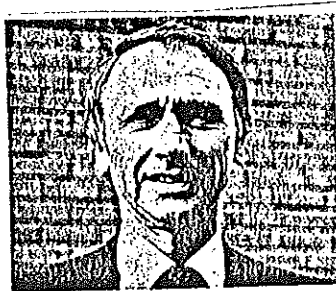

District Council Meeting held in Gleneagles Hotel, Perthshire
on Friday, 24th September, 1982

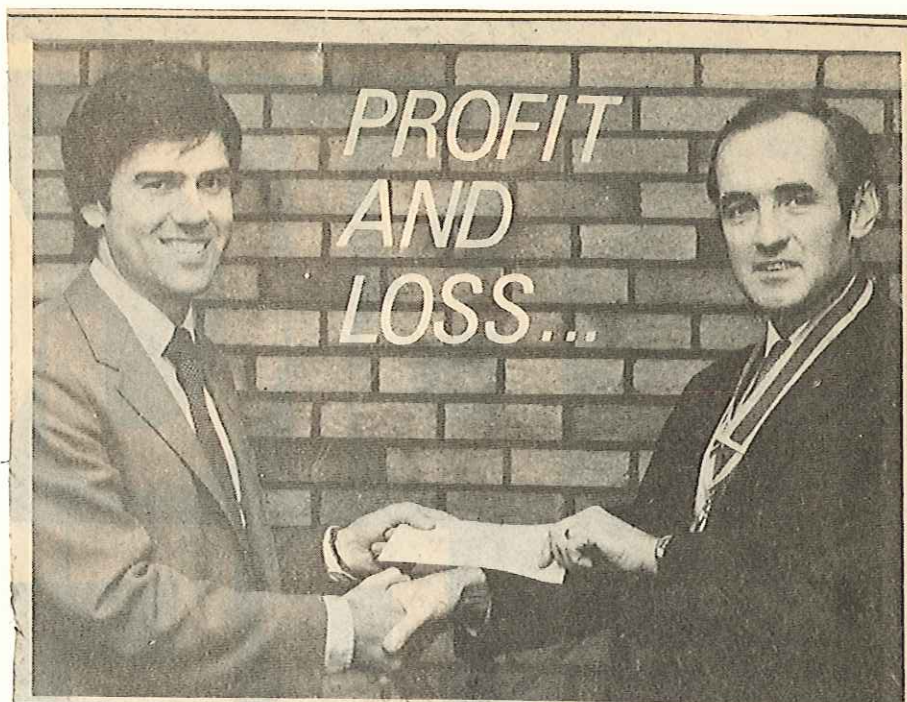

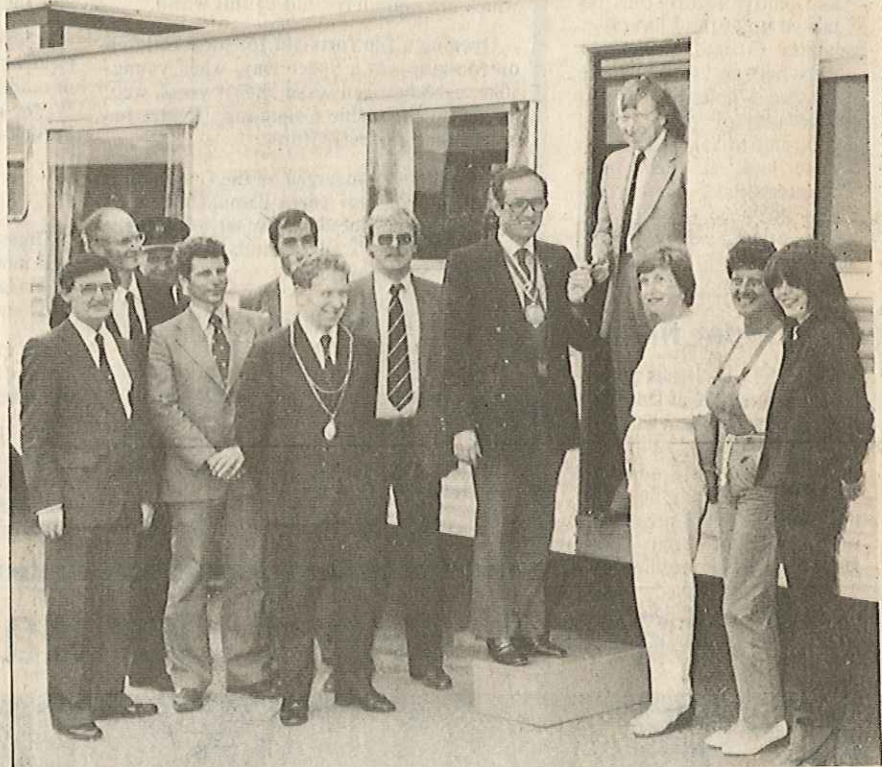
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NEW HOME SERVICE



RADIO West Fife moved home this week to a residential caravan provided by the Rotary Club of West Fife.

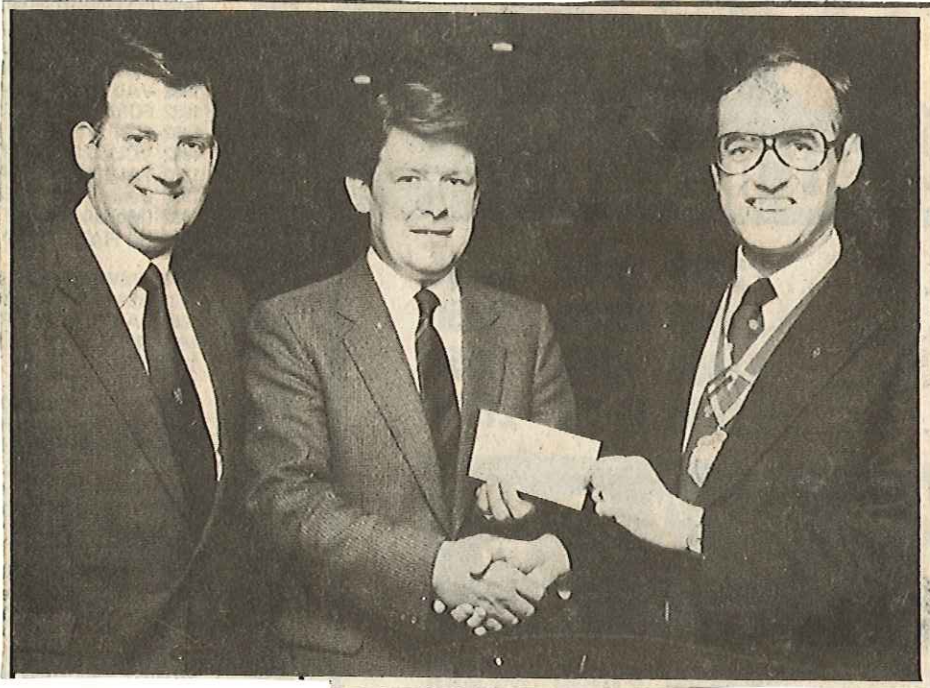
